The Requiem Mass is of ancient origin. In its usual form it can be traced back to the eighth or ninth century. Composers from the earliest periods to the present have been inspired by this expressive text to produce some of their finest work. Although there is a specific liturgical order for the Mass for the Dead, composers often do not observe this in their settings of the Requiem text, sometimes omitting movements entirely, sometimes combining two movements into one, sometimes adding texts that are not a part of the traditional Requiem Mass. Ron Jeffers comments that, "These choices always offer insights into the ways a particular composer is thinking musically, theologically, and philosophically..."

Gabriel Fauré is considered today to be the most advanced French composer of his generation, and a major influence on many early 20<sup>th</sup>-century composers. He showed a gift for music from an early age, recalling that from early childhood he would spend hours playing the harmonium in the chapel adjoining the school where his father was employed. When he was four or five, an old blind woman who heard him playing told his father about his gift for music, and he was enrolled in the École Niedermayer, where he studied for 11 years.

During his subsequent career he held a number of positions as organist, but as his compositional output grew, so did his reputation as a composer. In 1905 he became director of the Conservatoire, but his duties left him little time for composing, and in 1920 he retired and was at last able to dedicate himself fully to composition.

The Fauré Requiem is written in seven movements, using some of the traditional Requiem texts. He omits the Sequence, which includes such texts as "Dies irae," "dies illa," "Tuba mirum," and "Lacrymosa," and is generally included in a Requiem Mass. (Think Mozart or Verdi, for example.) The Responsory, which in Fauré's Requiem is shown as "Libera me," and the Antiphon, "In paradisum," actually come from the Burial Service, but are often included in musical settings of the Requiem Mass.

Fauré's gentle *Requiem* focuses on the positive vision of eternal rest. A clue to his personal theology is found in the Offertorium, where he has deliberately omitted the word "fidelium" (faithful) from the phrase "deliver the souls of the faithful departed," thus implying that all souls should be delivered from the pains of hell. Fauré described his *Requiem* as having been composed "for the pleasure of it." All we can say is, "Gabriel, the pleasure is ours."

Prize-winning composer and pianist **Jonathan Kolm** is an Associate Professor of composition, music theory and piano at Northern Virginia Community College's Annandale campus, where he is also active as an advocate for environmental and social causes. Many of his recent works incorporate environmental and scientific themes. His works have been performed by many acclaimed choruses, and at music festivals from Buffalo to Beijing. He maintains an active performing schedule, giving recitals at colleges and universities across the nation.

Kolm's music has been described as combining "rhythmic intensity, haunting lyricism and rich harmonic colors." Mark Kanny, *Pittsburgh Tribune-Review* Classical Music Critic has called it "fluent in its diversity" and he has received many commissions for new music.

For *Pieces of Night* Kolm selected five poems by Sara Teasdale (1884–1933), a noted American poet who won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1918. Her poetry often uses images of sun, moon or stars to set a mood or convey an idea. The word "Moonlight" appears in three of the five poems Kolm has selected and in fact is the title of one of them; another refers to the object that produces that light.

Teasdale's poetry focuses on the themes of beauty, love, and death, seen from a woman's perspective. In his own program notes for *Pieces of Night*, Kolm writes:

"May Night is for single voice, a gentle and optimistic breath of a spring night. At Night is a love

poem sent out through the nocturnal air across the city streets. *Moonlight* is the poet's thoughts on beauty and aging in their relationship to love. One of Teasdale's better known poems, *Peace*, combines imagery of the starry night and the ocean to convey thoughts of both inner and outer peace. *Tonight* is a blissful observation of the beauty of things both large and small being made for one another.

Maestro Isaac has chosen to alter the order of the songs performed in tonight's concert, ending with the fourth, *Peace*, with its images of water, sky, and stars.

The third work on our program again uses an ancient liturgical text, the Ordinary of the Mass. Generally composed in five or sometimes six movements (Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus [et] Benedictus, and Agnus Dei), Norwegian composer Ola Gjeilo has chosen to condense it into four (or five), giving each an English title. In his introduction to the Sunrise Mass, he says:

"The reason I used English titles in this setting of the Mass, seemingly unrelated to the texts, has mainly to do with the initial idea behind *Sunrise*. I wanted the musical development of the Mass to evolve from transparent and spacey, through increasing emotion and movement, to something solid and grounded – as a metaphor for human development from child to adult, for a spiritual journey, or the creative process itself."

Ola Gjeilo (pronounced Yay-lo) was born in Norway in 1978, and began composing at the age of five, though he did not actually learn to read music until he was seven. He studied at the Norwegian Academy of Music, then at Juilliard and at the Royal Academy of Music in London, receiving a bachelor's degree in composition. He then returned to Juilliard for graduate study, receiving a master's degree in 2006. He currently lives in New York.

The first movement of Gjeilo's *Sunrise Mass* is titled "The Spheres" and consists of the text of the Kyrie set for double choir. Gjeilo describes himself as a "symphonic" composer; the music is ultimately more important to him than the text. Composer and educator Kyra Rugen, whose paper analysing the *Sunrise Mass* is recommended by Gjeilo himself, describes it as "a metaphysical journey from the heavens to the earth." The second movement, "Sunrise" uses the text of the Gloria; the third movement, "The City," using the text of the Credo, is the most complex. In it Gjeilo seems to pay more attention to the text. As Rugen quotes him, this "...is the most powerful and assured text in the Mass. 'I believe' is a very strong statement."

Although the edition published in 2016 shows only four movements, Rugen tells us that the fourth movement should be "Identity & Ground," with "Identity" consisting of the text of the Sanctus and "Ground" including the Benedictus and Agnus Dei. Whether considered as one or two movements, this concluding part of the Mass is composed as a unit, with no break between what are two movements of the Ordinary. Rugen says of this final section, "No longer is the music floating in the spheres, rising with the sun, bustling in the city, or discovering the self." In her final paragraph she says, "The essence of the Mass includes …the entire spectrum of human emotion."

In 2013 the Damascus High School Chamber Singers were honored to perform, by invitation, at the prestigious Carnegie Hall as part of the Worldstrides Heritage Performance Program under the direction of Dr. Anton Armstrong. In 2015, the Chamber Singers made their National Presbyterian Church debut as a featured choir alongside the City Choir of Washington during their winter performance "The Holly & the Ivy." In 2016, Brian's advanced choir made their National City Christian Church debut, performing Ola Gjeilo's *Sunrise Mass* with organist

Stephen Kalnoske. In 2017 the DHS choirs performed, for a second time, at Carnegie Hall as part of the Worldstrides Heritage Performance program.

The Church Circle Singers, now in their third season, have been praised for their clean, focused choral sound and their adventurous programming. Their music-mentor initiative, the Church Circle Young Singers, offers a unique opportunity for talented high school choral students from Washington, D.C., Maryland, and Virginia to engage with the professional singers of CCS in an intensive rehearsal and performance process.

In addition to conducting, Brian maintains an active professional singing schedule and has performed with organizations like the Virginia Symphony Orchestra, the Virginia Chorale, Opera Roanoke, the National Symphony Orchestra, and the Washington Master Chorale.

Brian holds a Master of Music in Music Education from the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University.



**Stephen Kalnoske** is currently the Organist at Damscus United Methodist Church, after two years as Assistant Organist at National City Christian Church in Washington, D.C.

Stephen attended Boston Conservatory, studying organ with Sean Redrow as well as organ improvisation with Monte Maxwell at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md. He was a semi-finalist in the 2008 and 2010 National Competition in Organ Improvisation and has led workshops for organists on improvisation and service playing.

An active recitalist, Stephen has been featured at the Kennedy Center Concert Hall and the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, and Trinity Church Copley Square in Boston, Mass.

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

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
