

The March of the Women - Dame Ethel Mary Smyth (1858-1944) was taught piano and theory as a proper young English lady. Much to her father's horror, she took to music passionately and insisted on receiving further training. He refused, but she openly rebelled for long enough that he finally relented and allowed her to go to Leipzig to study music at the Conservatorium, where she met and was encouraged by Brahms, Grieg, Tchaikovsky, and Dvorak.

Smyth wrote "The March of the Women" in 1911, and it was premiered by a chorus of suffragists at a fundraising concert at the Albert Hall on March 23, 1911. This piece quickly became the battle cry of the British suffrage movement. Its most famous, though least public, performance occurred at Halloway Prison in London in 1912: over 100 suffragists were serving prison time for a coordinated protest. Ethel Smyth, ever the boisterous rebel, reportedly conducted the group with her toothbrush waving vigorously in her hand, while the suffragists sang and marched around the exercise yard.

Washington Women is a collection of choral songs with iconic texts taken from speeches, opinions, and interviews of sixteen remarkable women from across the political spectrum, all of whom spent part of their lives associated with Washington DC: First Ladies, Senators, Congresswomen, Supreme Court Justices, Secretaries of State, Vice President, and Speaker of the House of Representatives.

We Sing As One - B.E. Boykin (born 1989). B.E. Boykin's "We Sing As One" is a powerful anthem of unity and resilience. In this work, Boykin draws on the strength of collective voice to convey a message of shared purpose and empowerment. The piece is rich in rhythm, melody, and dynamic contrasts, offering both a celebration of individuality and the beauty of togetherness. The music builds with a sense of urgency, conveying the message that when voices join in harmony, they become a force greater than the sum of their parts. The text encourages us to stand together, to lift one another up, and to sing as one in pursuit of justice, equality, and peace. This piece carries a particular resonance today, reminding us of the importance of collective action in advancing women's rights and equality. The choir's voices become a reflection of the many women whose contributions often go unrecognized but whose unity and strength shape the world in profound ways. - Jordan Markwood

From Dusk to Dawn - Gwyneth Walker (born 1947). Gwyneth Walker's "From Dusk to Dawn" is a beautiful, evocative work that explores the cycle of the day, capturing the transitions between night and day, rest and awakening, darkness and light. Walker's sensitive treatment of the choir's voices, paired with lush harmonies and shifting textures, illustrates the gradual unfolding of time from the quiet of evening to the radiant arrival of the morning sun. The work's emotional arc takes the listener through moments of reflection, rest, and renewal, symbolizing not only the natural world but also the internal journey toward strength and empowerment. "From Dusk to Dawn" speaks to the resilience and courage that women display in the face of adversity—much like the transition from darkness to light, there is always a new dawn, offering hope and the promise of transformation.

Both this piece and "We Sing As One," performed by the Rock Ridge Chamber Choir, celebrate the strength of the human spirit, the power of community, and the eternal possibility of hope. These pieces serve as anthems for the women of today and as a reminder of the continual journey toward equality and justice for all women. - Jordan Markwood

Still I Rise - Rosephanye Powell (Born 1962) has been hailed as one of America's premier women composers of solo vocal and choral music. Dr. Powell's works have been premiered at distinguished halls around the country, including Carnegie Hall, the Lincoln Center, and Spivey Hall, and commissioned by professional choral ensembles, including Cantus and the Grammy award-winning men's vocal ensemble Chanticleer. Dr. Powell serves as Professor of Voice at Auburn University. An accomplished singer and voice professor, Dr. Powell's research focuses on the art of the African-American spiritual and voice care concerns for voice professionals. Still I Rise is based on a poem by Maya Angelou.

Keep Marching (from the Broadway musical Suffs) -Shaina Taub (Born 1988) is a classically trained pianist and selftaught accordion player, composer, and singer who worked with Sara Bareilles and Josh Groban to co-write the Emmy Awardnominated opening number for the 2018 Tony Awards. She recently teamed up with Elton John to pen the lyrics for the upcoming Broadway musical The Devil Wears Prada. Shaina starred in her own original musical Suffs, which premiered in spring 2022 at Off-Broadway's Public Theater. Suffs follows suffragist Alice Paul (Taub) as she joins forces with Carrie Chapman Catt and the National American Woman Suffrage Association for the right to vote. However, Paul's desire for direct action clashes with the stoic Catt, who wants to keep women's virtue at the center of the suffrage campaign to win over President Woodrow Wilson. "Keep Marching" is the closing piece in the musical, a rousing reminder that "progress is possible, not quaranteed," and we all must carry on even if the work is never completely finished.

ABOUT THE COMPOSERS



DAVID CHASE

David Chase has been Music Director, Music Supervisor and/or Arranger for 40 Broadway musicals, as well as for numerous productions in London's West End. He continues his longstanding associations with the Boston Pops, Radio City Music Hall, and the Lyric Opera of Chicago, and has written and arranged numerous choral works that have been recorded by Judith Clurman's Essential Voices USA and

published by Hal Leonard. As Music Director and arranger for NBC's The Sound of Music Live! and Peter Pan!, he was at the forefront of bringing live musicals back to television, and Emmy-nominated for Outstanding Musical Direction for both programs. Other TV includes Music Direction and coarranging for Apple TV's Schmigadoon!, and arrangements and orchestrations for The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel and Crazy Ex-Girlfriend. He has been nominated for a Grammy for his work on the Broadway musical Nice Work if You Can Get It, and an Olivier for Anything Goes.





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ABOUT THE COMPOSERS



JUDITH CLURMAN

As a conductor, chorus master, and educator, Judith Clurman has collaborated with some of the world's most distinguished ensembles, composers, and institutions. A passionate advocate of new music and innovative programming, Clurman has commissioned premieres, developed ensembles, and directed work from the classical, theatre, television, and film repertoires. She has received two Emmy nominations and conducted Tania Léon's music on the Grammy and Latin Grammy nominated CD, In Motion.

Judith is the musical director for Essential Voices USA, an ensemble that has appeared at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, and on NPR's Tiny Desk Concerts and NBC television. In addition, she is Resident Conductor for the Choral Society of the Hamptons and teaches voice at the Manhattan School of Music.

She has worked with many of the world's finest symphonies, including the New York Philharmonic, Boston Symphony Orchestra, and the Orchestra of St Luke's, and she previously conducted The New York Concert Singers, a group that appeared on Lincoln Center's Great Performers and Carnegie Hall's concert series. Highlights of her career include conducting performances at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, conducting the nationally televised "Music of the Spirit" (NBC and PBS), conducting performances with the New York City Ballet, supervising and conducting the choral music for the SONY movie The Song of Names, co-directing/music directing Harvard University's Bernstein: Boston to Broadway project, music directing (associate) of all things vocal for the 39th season of Sesame Street, creating and conducting the Singing Christmas Tree Float in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, and conducting the nationally televised July 4th Macy's Fireworks Spectacular (NBC), with the Diva Jazz Orchestra. She has commissioned and conducted new works by over seventy American composers, ranging from works by Milton Babbitt and Pierre Jalbert to Jason Robert Brown and Stephen Schwartz.

As an educator, Judith was Director of Choral Activities at The Juilliard School from 1989-2007. She has served as a visiting artist/teacher at numerous institutions, including Cambridge and Harvard Universities, and was the vocal specialist at the National Endowment for the Arts/Columbia University Institute of Classical Music. Judith edits two choral series for Hal Leonard. Her own music and arrangements are published by G. Schirmer, Hal Leonard, and Schott, and have been performed by major symphony orchestras and choruses throughout our nation. Judith is a graduate of The Juilliard School.

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
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KATHRYN HARSHA, ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Kathryn Harsha holds a
Master of Music in
Conducting from the
Cleveland Institute of Music
and a Bachelor of Arts in
Piano Performance from
Bluffton University. While
studying at the Sorbonne in
Paris, she served as
Assistant Conductor of the
Chorale des Étudiants

Etrangères and studied conducting at the Conservatoire Messiaen in Saint-Maurice, France.

An active conductor in choral, opera, and orchestral music, Ms. Harsha has worked with ensembles across the country, conducting most recently in Severance Hall and the Kennedy Center, and in France, Italy, Austria, and Germany. Kathryn served for many years as Music Director and Conductor of the Lakeland Civic Orchestra in Cleveland, Ohio, and as the Music Director of Opera per Tutti, now the Cleveland Opera Theater. For more than 20 years, she was the Music Director of the Sing Out! for Cleveland Rape Crisis Center benefit concert, where the Visionary Voice Award was named in her honor in 2018.

Ms. Harsha enjoys working with musicians of all ages, including young people at the Peabody Children's Chorus and Opus Community Music School, and mature singers at Encore Creativity for Older Adults, where she is currently the Interim Artistic Director and conducts multiple ensembles across the Washington metropolitan area.

Kathryn is honored to serve as the Artistic Director of Pro Coro Alexandria and the Alexandria Choral Society for its 55th season.

THE ROCK RIDGE CHAMBER CHOIR

The Rock Ridge Chamber Choir was established in the fall of 2015 under the direction of Jordan Markwood as the top performing choral ensemble at Rock Ridge High School in Ashburn, VA. In its inaugural year, the Chamber Choir was invited to perform for the US Department of Education's FSASSY Awards, where they received a standing ovation. The Chamber Choir has consistently received Superior Ratings at the District Choral Assessment. In the spring of 2017 the Rock Ridge Chamber Choir was selected as one of only two choral ensembles in the MD/VA/DC area to perform on the Millennium Stage at the Kennedy Center as a part of a Music in Our Schools Month Celebration. In 2018 and 2024 the Chamber Choir also performed at the Virginia Music Educators Association annual conference. Members of the Chamber Choir have been selected for numerous honors, including All County Chorus, All-District Chorus, All-Virginia Honor Choirs, VMEA Senior Honor Choirs, Virginia Governor's School for the Visual and Performing Arts, National and Regional ACDA Honor Choirs, National YoungArts Foundation Winners, and many more.






JORDAN MARKWOOD, DIRECTOR, ROCK RIDGE CHAMBER CHOIR

Jordan Markwood is a passionate musician excited about bringing people together to communicate meaningful messages through singing. He is in his eleventh year as the Choral Director and Fine Arts Department Chair at Rock Ridge High School and also

serves as the Music Director at Galilee UMC. Mr. Markwood was named the 2023 VA Region 4 Teacher of the Year and both the 2022 Loudoun County and Washington Post Teacher of the Year. Previously, he taught at Stone Hill M.S. for seven years and was the VA-ACDA MS R&R Chair from 2013-2015. Mr. Markwood is the current VCDA Secretary and previous leadership roles include Chair of the VMEA Honors Choir Auditions, and VCDA District XIV Representative. Mr. Markwood holds a Bachelor of Music degree in Music Education from Houghton College and a Master of Music in Vocal Pedagogy and Performance from Westminster Choir College of Rider University.







JUSTIN STRELETZ, COLLABORATIVE PIANIST

Justin Streletz is excited to be returning to Alexandria Choral Society for the 2024-2025 Season! He is a local collaborative pianist who has worked with many school divisions in Northern Virginia for concerts and festivals. Justin is also a music director, including a pit conductor and vocal director. During the day he

is an elementary music teacher, entering his 10th year of teaching. Justin studied piano at West Chester University with Dr. Patricia Powell. In his free time, he enjoys reading, traveling, working out at OrangeTheory, and all things LEGO.





JIHEA CHOI, CELLIST

Jihea Choi holds a Master of Music degree from University of Maryland, College Park, as well as a Performer's Certificate from Northern Illinois University and a Bachelor of Music degree from The Catholic University of America. She studied with some of the most renowned cellists, including Robert Newkirk, David Teie and Marc Johnson.

Trained in the Suzuki Method, Ms. Choi is passionate about helping students reach their full potential, adjusting the curriculum to suit individual students. She was on the faculty at the Peabody Preparatory of Johns Hopkins University. She also taught at Cellospeak, whose goal is to build the technique and ensemble skills of adult amateur students, and performs as a member of the Cellospeak faculty ensemble, 16 Cellos.

A chamber musician as well as an accomplished orchestral cellist, Ms. Choi plays with the Washington Concert Opera Orchestra, Maryland Symphony in addition to National Philharmonic Orchestra. Ms. Choi currently serves as an associate principal cellist with the Alexandria Symphony.



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JENNIFER QUIÑONES, ACCOMPANIST

Jennifer Quiñones, the Founder and Conductor of Inspiro, has been the Director of Music at Community Lutheran Church in Sterling, Virginia since 2016. She has conducted several large works such as Rachmaninoff Vespers, Faure Requiem, and other large choral works while at Community. Jennifer has been a church music director and organist since 1998 in

various churches throughout the country. She is also the creative director of *Gabelli Lullabies*, a lullaby creative company that she started in 2019.

For many years, Jennifer was a working musician in New York City, accompanying and conducting for many musical performances with opera, vocalists, ensembles, and teachers. She was also an accompanist for the Juilliard School for several vocal classes. She previously held the position youth music director at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Rochester NY where she conducted Menotti's Amahl and the Night Visitors. While in Rochester, she was the Assistant Conductor for the Eastman Bach Children's Chorus and the Mozart Children's Chorus at the Eastman School of Music. Many of her responsibilities as assistant conductor included preparing and conducting formal concerts annually with the Rochester Chamber Orchestra's performance of The Messiah, and the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra's performance of The Nutcracker Ballet.



Jennifer has been sought after as a performer of new music and has performed with such artists as David Craighead, Hugh Smith, Stephen Kennedy, and the Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra of Washington DC. Jennifer also appeared in Lincoln Center's Reel to Reel series production, "What's Opera, Doc?" as the "Maestro" during the 2003 - 2005 seasons which was produced by Alina Bloomgarden.
