

Mr. Burgess is an alumnus of the CoOPERAtive Program, SongFest, as well as the Crescendo Summer Institute where his portrayal of Leporello in Mozart's *Don Giovanni* was recorded and broadcast on regional Hungarian TV. Mr. Burgess was also named a 2011 National Finalist in the Classical Singer Competition in Los Angeles, and was selected to participate in representing the Eastman School of Music at the Kennedy Center as part of the Conservatory Project, which can been viewed on <a href="https://www.kennedy-center.org">www.kennedy-center.org</a>.

Other roles include the title role in Gilbert and Sullivan's *The Mikado*, The Boston Conservatory; Crébillon, *La Rondine*, The Boston Conservatory; Sarastro, *Die Zauberflöte*, Opera del West; Keçal, *The Bartered Bride*, Eastman Opera Theatre; Collatinus, *The Rape of Lucretia*, Eastman Opera Theatre; Zoroastro, *Orlando*, Eastman Opera Theatre; Frank Maurrant, *Street Scene*, Eastman Opera Theatre.

Equally at home with oratorio and concert repertoire, Mr. Burgess has performed as soloist in J.S. Bach's *Magnificat in D-major* with the Boston Conservatory Chorale; *Messiah*, Genesee Valley Orchestra and Chorus; bass soloist, *Szenen aus Goethes Faust*; bass soloist in Beethoven's *Missa Solemnis*; Jesus, *St. Matthew Passion*. He holds his B.M. from the Boston Conservatory and his M.M. from the Eastman School of Music.

The **Virginia Chamber Orchestra** has launched its 44th season led by Music Director David Grandis, one of the most accomplished young conductors currently appearing on both sides of the Atlantic. Founded in 1971 as a professional touring orchestra which traveled by bus to present performances in areas of Virginia where live orchestral concerts were not offered, it established its base in Northern Virginia in the early 1980s. In addition, the orchestra has served a nationwide audience of millions with educational television broadcasts since 1998, and with free streaming videos on its web site for students of all ages.

Emil de Cou, Wolf Trap Festival Conductor, served as VCO Music Director for four seasons, highly recommending David Grandis as his successor.

Maestro Grandis is currently Director of Orchestras at the College of William and Mary. He has guest-conducted orchestras in a number of Europen countries.

The orchestra is dedicated to bringing fine classical music to the widest possible audience through concerts in Northern Virginia and exceptional outreach programs that provide complimentary tickets and concerts to the underserved in our communities, including the Wounded Warriors and their families and also include teens at risk, mentally/physically challenged people, and foster children and parents.



Hailed as "a strikingly gifted tenor, with a deeply moving, unblemished voice" (sfmusicjournal.com), Brian Thorsett (Uriel) has appeared in opera, oratorio and recital across the world. Since taking to the operatic stage in 2001, he has been seen and heard in over 100 diverse operatic roles, ranging from Monteverdi to Britten, back to Rameau and ahead again to works composed specifically for his talents. Roles in the current season include the title character in Handel's *Judas Maccabaeus*, as well as creating the

Narrator and Bull in the premiere of Josheff's Europa and the Bull.

As a concert singer Mr. Thorsett fosters a stylistically diversified repertoire of over 250 works, which has taken him to concert halls across the US and Europe. Future engagements include a rare performance of Blitzstein's *Airborne Symphony* and the world premiere of Stacey Garrop's *Terra Nostra*.

Closely associated with expanding the vocal-chamber genre, he has been involved in premieres and commissions by a number of composers. His voice has been featured in film and commercials, being the artist for Soundiron studio's *Voice of Rapture: The Tenor*. He also makes many concert appearances with SF Opera & Ballet Principal horn Kevin Rivard. The duo will be seen in future concerts premiering *Bourne to Shelley* (Eshima), *The Jolly Hunter* (Holmes), *Perceval* (Bosc) and unearthing forgotten works for this combination of instruments.

Other projects include working with Theatre Comique, which specializes in historically informed performances of early Broadway music. Mr. Thorsett's first solo album will be released spring 2015, featuring works of Frank Tours, Idabelle Firestone, Guy d'Hardelot and their contemporaries arranged for salon orchestra. He will also contribute the *Rossetti Songs* of David Conte to a recording of that composer's music.

He is a graduate of San Francisco Opera's Merola Program, Glimmerglass Opera's Young American Artist program, American Bach Soloists' Academy, the Britten-Pears Young Artist Programme at Aldeburgh, England and he spent two summers at the Music Academy of the West. Mr. Thorsett is an Assistant Professor at Virginia Tech and previously served on faculty at Santa Clara University and University of California at Berkeley.

American bass-baritone **Zachary Burgess** (Raphael, Adam) will be returning to Boston in 2015 to take the role of Prospero in the world premiere of *The Tempest* with The Shakespeare Concerts. He has most recently been an Emerging Artist with the Green Mountain Opera Festival where he performed the role of Alidoro in Rossini's *La Cenerentola*.

Previous engagements include the 2014 inaugural season debut of D.C. Public Opera, where he portrayed Masetto and Don Giovanni; and was featured in recital

Gendron conducted the world premiere of Sean Pflueger's *Children in the Mist* for Riverbend Opera and was Music Director for Michael Gordon's *Lightning at Our Feet*, which was co-produced by Virginia Tech Theater Arts and New York City's Ridge Theater.

Gendron earned degrees from Central Michigan University and the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He has presented interest sessions and conducted invitational performances for the American Choral Directors Association, Virginia Music Educators Association, and Virginia Music Teachers Association. Gendron currently leads the choirs at St. James Catholic Church in Falls Church, Virginia.



Robin Beckman enjoys a versatile career as a pianist and singer working as a soloist, chamber ensemble singer, piano teacher and accompanist. With a voice that "gently glides into heaven" (*Washington Examiner*), she has performed with the Bach Consort, the Boston Early Music Fringe Festival, Washington Master Chorale, at the National Cathedral, and in the quartet Third Practice, which got rave reviews in both the *New York Times* and the *Washington Post* for its performance of Andriessen's *La Commedia* with the Great Noise Ensemble. #### ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Founded in 1970, the **Alexandria Choral Society** aspires to enhance the cultural life of the city of Alexandria and surrounding communities by presenting engaging musical programs at the highest artistic level. ACS ensembles consistently offer meaningful and exciting musical experiences to both singers and audiences through diverse repertoire, education, community outreach, and performance excellence.



**Brian Gendron** serves as Artistic Director of the Alexandria Choral Society (ACS.) Since joining the organization in 2009, the choir has shared the stage with the Alexandria Symphony Orchestra for Mozart's *Requiem*, Orff's *Carmina Burana*, Verdi's *Messa da Requiem*, Holst's *The Planets*, and the world premiere of Kim Allen Kluge's *River Poem*. They have

presented Bach's *Komm, Jesu, komm*, Beethoven's *Symphony No. 9*, Brahms' *Schicksalslied*, and Pärt's *Berliner Messe*, and have led Handel's *Messiah* at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. Pro Coro Alexandria, a chamber choir founded in 2012 and selected from the ACS roster, premiered Truman Harris and David Teie's ... *again and ever again* with Eclipse Chamber Orchestra and performed at the National Gallery of Art. Both ensembles will appear with the Virginia Chamber Orchestra this season.

With a great passion for choral-orchestral repertoire, Gendron was on the podium for Brahms' *Ein deutsches Requiem*, Beethoven's *Mass in C*, Haydn's *Lord Nelson Mass*, and Mozart's *Coronation Mass*. He prepared Stravinsky's *Symphony of Psalms* for the Roanoke Symphony Orchestra and Vaughan Williams' *Dona Nobis Pacem* for the New River Valley Symphony. Gendron conducted the Kansas City Baroque Consortium in a performance of Handel's *Dixit Dominus*, and led a series of concerts featuring the cantatas of J.S. Bach, as well as his *Mass in B minor*.

Previously, Gendron served as Artistic Director of the Grammy Award winning Maryland Boy Choir, who appeared at the Music Center at Strathmore and Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center, as well as in concert performances of Mussorgsky's *Boris Godunov* with Mariinsky Opera and Puccini's *La Bohème* with Baltimore Concert Opera. His previous teaching appointments include Conductor-in-Residence at Hollins University and Director of Choral Activities at Virginia Tech. His university ensembles appeared in Carnegie Hall, Brooklyn Academy of Music's Howard Gilman Opera Theater, and the Washington National Cathedral.

Gendron served as Chorus Master for Opera Roanoke productions of Handel's *Acis and Galatea*, Britten's *Noye's Fludde*, Verdi's *Macbeth* and *Otello*, and Beethoven's *Fidelio*. He also joined the American Opera Theater

#### PROGRAM NOTES

Although he is well-known as a prolific composer of symphonies, string quartets, and Masses, perhaps the crowning achievement of the long and productive life of Austrian composer **Joseph Haydn** (sometimes referred to as Franz Joseph Haydn) was his great oratorio *Der Schöpfung*, in English *The Creation*. Apparently the first musical score ever published with text in two languages, the libretto began life in English, was translated into German by Baron Gottfried von Swieten at Haydn's request, and then back into English, again by Swieten, to match the text to the music Haydn had written for the German libretto.

Of course, this led to some awkwardness, especially since it seems Swieten's knowledge of English pronunciation was not as good as it should have been. Almost from the beginning, other translators have created their own versions, though many of the awkward phrases and unfamiliar word usages remain. In particular, English speakers may be confused by the word-order inversions, such as "The lord and king of nature all" instead of "The lord and king of all nature" (No. 24) or "Thy pow'r adore the heav'n and earth" instead of "The heav'n and earth adore thy pow'r" (No. 30). There are other places where the editor of the edition used in this performance, Nicholas Temperley, changed the order, notably in No. 13, where "The wonder of his works/The firmament dispays" has been changed to "The firmament displays/The wonder of his works."

In spite of Haydn's wish that English text should be used when the oratorio was performed for English-speaking audiences, many conductors prefer to perform it in German, no matter what language is spoken by the listeners. The edition the chorus is using today is notable for having only the English words. The first performance from this edition was at Westminster Abbey in 1982, just over 200 years since the first performances at Vienna's Swartzenberg Palace in 1798. The first public performance took place the following year.

Haydn's career spanned the transitional years from the High Baroque to the Classical styles in music. He was acquainted with both Leopold and Wolfgang Mozart, and he had also met Beethoven. His final public appearance at a concert in Vienna was a performance of *The Creation*, conducted by Salieri, in March 1808. A picture from the time indicated a small choir, with boys instead of women, and a very small orchestra. Our performance today also uses a reduced orchestra, but Alexandria Choral Society does boast of fine women singers!
